

2020 was a heck of a year! With all the changes that came with COVID, we were able to maintain our flexibility and resilience with no gaps in our service at all. During fiscal year 2020-2021, the need for our services continued to grow. We had an abundance of compassionate volunteers ready, willing and able to step up to the plate and help us achieve our mission.

Over the past calendar year we delivered more than 59,781 meals to primarily home bound people living in the greater Fort Collins and Wellington areas. We are are experiencing a


I am in awe of the shear dedication of our volunteers who choose to spend their lunch hour delivering meals for us.



Financial Position



We could not do what we do without the generous support of UCHealth. Our long standing partnership with Poudre Valley Hospital is the most critical partnership of our program.



The UCHealth/PVH staff provide nutrient analysis and menu planning with the kitchen staff executing meal preparation for MOWFC. Meals are based on the DASH diet (Dietary Approach to Stop Hypertension). Clients choose between two entree options daily. We are also able to offer meals that meet specific individual needs including vegetarian. renal for those with liver and kidney function issues,


dental and pureed for those with chewing or swallowing difficulties, and a large portion for those saving half for later in the day or for a larger appetite. These options help support the independence clients may have lost as a result of aging, diminished capacity, or no longer driving.

Not only has UCHealth offered this service to us since 1971, but they also provide a substantial in-kind donation that subsidizes the cost of our meals, enabling us to keep our overhead and fees low. UCHealth figures demonstrate the total cost to prepare our meals is \$7.00/meal, yet they provide them to MOWFC at the rate of \$4.00/meal. The hospital also has designated parking lot space for volunteer drivers and an area to pack up the meals for their routes each day. Our collaboration with UCHealth is one our most valuable relationships and enables MOWFC to continue to feed the people we do.





We were fortunate enough to receive CARES Act funding from the Office on Aging and a grant from the City of Fort Collins which helped subsidize the cost of meals for our lowest income clients.



A very special thank you to Odell

offered to store our emergency
food boxes in their warehouse
until delivery to clients. With a
grant we purchased the boxes for
clients in the event of inclement
weather. For the past 3 years,
Odell employees have gone above
and beyond by delivering the
boxes to over 200 homes during

I first understood the value of Meals on Wheels volunteers several years before I became one, thanks to the perspective of my grandfather. He enjoyed healthy meals and we felt peace of mind knowing someone was checking in on him regularly. But what my grandfather loved the most were his interactions with his meal delivery drivers. He often told me about them one was ex-military (like him), another would bring her son with her to brighten his day. These people enriched his life, and frankly, he made a mark on theirs. I know this because of the sentiments several left on his tribute page when my grandfather passed away.

These individuals inspired me, and I began volunteering with Meals on Wheels for Fort Collins (MOWFC) more than two years ago. As a substitute driver, I can connect with folks from all over our community. Sometimes clients prefer a brief exchange and efficient meal delivery. Others enjoy a longer conversation or invite me in to see their home, meet their pets or their spouse. With those interactions, it's easy to feel the joy and gratitude of our clients. My teen daughters also experience it when they ride routes with me in the summers. My husband loves riding along on occasion and helping distribute weekend blizzard

bags. With every delivery we bring a smile, along with the meal we leave behind.

In the spring of 2020, the pandemic restricted our ability to enter residences or show our smiles behind our masks, yet interactions with clients were even more critical. Isolation was increasing during the stay-at-home period, and hot meals and friendly words were in greater demand. At the same time, my daughters and I also joined FCMOW's core packing team rotation. Orchestrated by the incredible Fort Collins MOW staff, this COVID response plan has been a great success. Reducing the number of volunteers handling meals inside the hospital, while safely and effectively packing each route for delivery drivers, we have adapted protocols (more than once!) to meet the needs of the community we serve. Although I'm not face-to-face with clients in this capacity, it has given me the opportunity to work alongside and get to know so many dedicated MOW volunteers.

Donating my time isn't as selfless as it might seem. Just like the volunteers that made a difference for my grandfather, being part of MOW enriches all of us. It's opened my daughters' eyes to the value of

I am honored to be a MOW volunteer, as well as a donor.









